

Maintaining this ethos and willingness to accept feedback will assist students on their journey and enable them to be more proactive, methodical and have goals that can be clearly realised.

As the term draws to a close, a working routine should be established with homework and study or revision occurring each day. I would also like to remind you of the importance of your son or daughter attending lessons right up until the end of this Term. If a student starts to feel overwhelmed with a task then the first thing they should do is discuss it with their teacher and this is best done earlier rather than
- Reflection: Once the assessment marks are back it is important that the assessment process doesn't end there. Any assessment or exam should be treated as a learning experience. Review and reflection on the task and the feedback supplied by the teacher is the most important aspect of an assessment.

The upcoming summer holidays, besides being a time to rest and recharge their energy levels, are a perfect opportunity to reflect on the past term and think about any changes that need to be made for the new year. Students can get up to date on class notes and summaries so they are not feeling so overwhelmed by the next assessment period.

As Jaz Holland, a current Year 12 student exclaimed upon seeing the motivational quotes "It makes me want to come into the library and learn!"


Ella Cahalan says "It creates a welcoming and supporting environment that makes you want to study".


